ANOTHER GOOD REASON TO READ SCRIPTURE

One of the things that happen when we read scripture in a slow, calm and prayerful way is that passages we may have read or heard in church many times before suddenly seem to jump off the page at us, and we understand them better – in a new way.

To give an example: that is precisely what happened to me as I was saying my Divine Office this morning – Morning Prayer, Thursday week 4, ordinary time. After the psalms we have to say comes a scripture reading; this morning's happened to be Romans 8: 18-21 – just a few short verses. I would like, here, to speak about the whole passage, but I shall give you only the first verse in the hope that you will look up the rest in your own bibles. That verse runs:

"I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us."

What a message of hope St Paul is giving us for "this present time", when we are all acquainted with suffering – some profoundly, but all of us to some degree! It is tempting, and easy, to feel overwhelmed, not only by coronavirus but also by all the other things that are happening in the world, but when we think about this passage, which was inspired by God Himself, we realise that He is very much involved in our situation at the deepest possible level and is in effect saying to us: "My dear, dear children: I know life can be very grim at times and I know how much you are suffering. You may wonder why I permit this, given my deepest love for you, but I beg you to believe (even if you do not

understand), that my plan is unfolding and that you *will* come to see the eternal wonders which I have in store for you. Moreover, you will realise that the very sufferings you are undergoing now play a part – mysterious to you, but not to Me – in building up that glory. Trust in Me!"

The rest of the passage from Morning Prayer today gives a wonderful answer to something I have often mentioned in my homilies when I say that we may feel often that "everything is falling apart" and that everything we are so familiar with will pass away; St Paul goes on to explain that creation as we know it, that is the world we are all so used to, has indeed been, from the beginning "subjected to futility" – but he then reassures us that "creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay". In other words, part of the "glory that is to be revealed to us" consists of seeing this very creation we know so well transformed into something wonderful beyond all telling, in which there will be no decay, collapse, sadness or death!

These words have barely scratched the surface of Romans 8: 18-21, and I pray that next time I read the passage it will be granted to me to see even more clearly the "wonders God has in store for those who love Him" (1 Corinthians 2:9).

Campaigns in support of Life

- The Department of Health is holding a public consultation on whether to continue the practice of allowing abortion providers to send abortion pills to women so that they can perform their own abortion at home.
