LET'S DE-CLUTTER OURSELVES FOR LENT

"The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent and believe the Gospel (Good News)": these words from Mk 1: 15 mark the opening of Jesus' ministry and it is good to ponder them as we begin Lent. We know that repentance means changing the trajectory of the path we are on – perhaps slightly, perhaps quite radically. As we once again try to do this, we realise that we have acquired a great deal of what is actually unnecessary baggage as we struggled along our path, and part of the process of repentance involves shedding as much of that baggage as we can – remember what a relief it is when we have been carrying heavy bags, for example, and can finally put them down: true repentance, I am sure, brings the same blessed feeling of relief!

As we approach Lent, therefore let us each look honestly at how we are living, to see what are the elements of our lives which are dragging us down - we all have some - and which are keeping us short of perfection ("Be perfect, as your Heavenly Father is perfect" said Jesus in Mt 5:48 — which can be translated as "Set no bounds to your love, just as your heavenly Father sets none to His"). In the spirit of this verse, may we be sure that this Lent has the potential to be the best ever as long as we persevere, and will bring us to even greater joy when we finally come to Easter.

So, what is the best thing for me to do this Lent? The answer depends on who you are, but I would offer three essential tools which the Church Fathers (that is, the greatest Christian saints and scholars of the earliest centuries) insist are essential in the search for God; they are:

PRAYER FASTING ALMSGIVING

If we practice these three in a humble spirit, all the while asking God to enable us to perform them in order to bring us, and others, closer to Him, we will be making the best possible use of this holy season. One word of caution: each of these three tools involves putting ourselves out in some way; this year I want to avoid the temptation of outlining examples of this, in the hope that each one of us (yes, certainly including me!) will pray for the grace to see *ourselves* as God sees us and learn, in that way, what are the things we need to shed, and the areas of our lives in which we are lacking.

Above all, remember that the surest way to fail in Lent is to aim at being an absolute spiritual athlete over the next forty days; let us resolve to make sacrifices which we *can* make, albeit possibly with some discomfort to ourselves, and not take on things which we know we won't be able to see through. Above all, remember that no deed done for God goes unnoticed by Him – what enormous value the Lord gave to the widow's mite!

It may help to reflect on the Collect (opening prayer) for Ash Wednesday - but be warned: it does contain some strong language......

Grant, O Lord, that we may begin with holy fasting this campaign of Christian service, so that, as we take up battle against spiritual evils, we may be armed with weapons of self-restraint.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ.....

God bless you all and let us pray for each other.
