## White Flower Appeal 2022

The Society for the Protection of Unborn children (SPUC) is holding its appeal this weekend. SPUC's Mission is to save the lives of unborn babies and to protect women from abortion. Every new life is a wonderful gift from God and every baby is loved and cherished by God from the first moment of his or her existence. SPUC works to build a society which fully reflects this unconditional love that God has for everyone of us.

Tragically the threats facing unborn children in our country today are very great. Since the Abortion Act was passed in 1967 nearly ten million precious babies have lost their lives as a result of abortion. And millions of women, and men too, have been deeply wounded.

In March 2020 the government introduced "home abortion" under the coronavirus regulations. This means that abortion pills can be taken at home to induce abortion. This has led to more innocent babies losing their lives. And there are serious dangers for women too. These drugs, which can lead to serious medical complications, are taken without the supervision of health professionals. According to an independent poll which SPUC commissioned, the majority of GPs are worried about this.

Moving abortion into the home makes women much more vulnerable to coercion from abusive partners and family members. 87% of GPs are concerned about women being at risk of being coerced into an unwanted abortion, through this form of domestic abuse. This is a huge blind spot in our public debate: how can abortion be about choice when so many women experience coercion?

Public consultations have been held in England, Scotland and Wales on making "home abortion" permanent. SPUC has fought this by doing what we do best, mobilising pro-life men and women up and down our country to put pressure on politicians to protect mothers and babies. We are awaiting the results of the consultation.

Another group under pressure are our wonderful pro-life young people who are under increasing attack at universities. Pro-life students at the Universities of Oxford and Exeter have experienced violent intimidation and attempts have been make to suppress their right to speak about pro-life issues.

You can protect our right to speak about abortion by signing the postcard (on the ushers' table), as a part of our petition in support of the right of all of us to speak up about abortion. We can't defend mothers and babies if our voices are silenced. Please fill in your postcard today, and post it to SPUC. We will gather them together and present them to  $N^o$  10 on your behalf.

Please could you also support SPUC's work by giving as generously as you can to the White Flower collection today. Every donation., of whatever size, will help to save babies' lives. There are many babies, children and adults alive today because of your generous support for SPUC in past years. Let's keep going until every baby is safe. Thank you!
